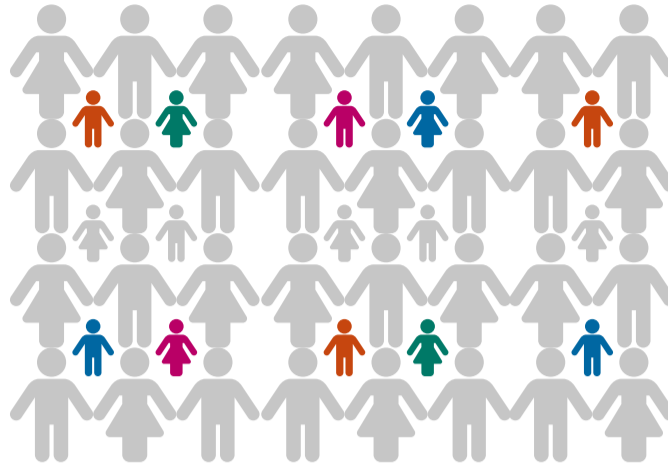
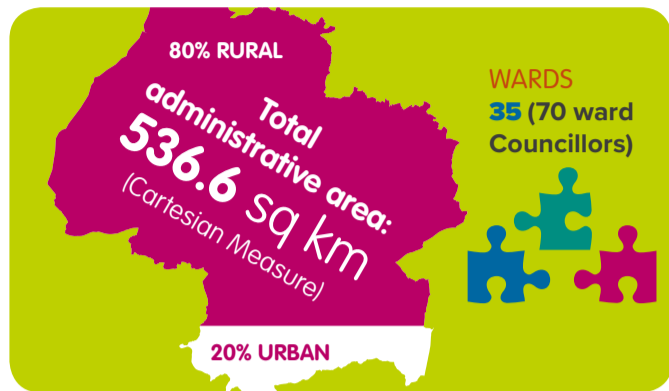

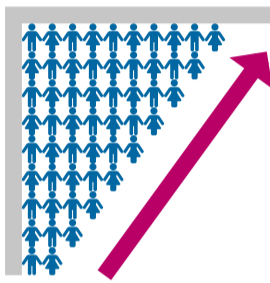

In the year April 2017 - March 2018 **78.8%** of the working age population were in **employment**. This is higher than the national rate of **75.2%**.

In August 2015, **4,935 children** lived in **low-income families** (10.1% of all children). England average (16.8%).

In December 2017 the average house price was **£260,000**. This is above the national average of **£234,000**.

From April 2017 - March 2018 **unemployment rate** was **3.3%** of the economically active population. This is considerably lower than the national rate of **4.3%**.

In November 2016 **5.2%** of the working age population were **claiming key out-of-work benefits**. This is lower than the national rate of **8.1%**.

1,010 residents aged 16-24yrs claim key out-of-work benefits (**3.3%** of the total population of this age group). This is lower than the national rate (**4.8%**).

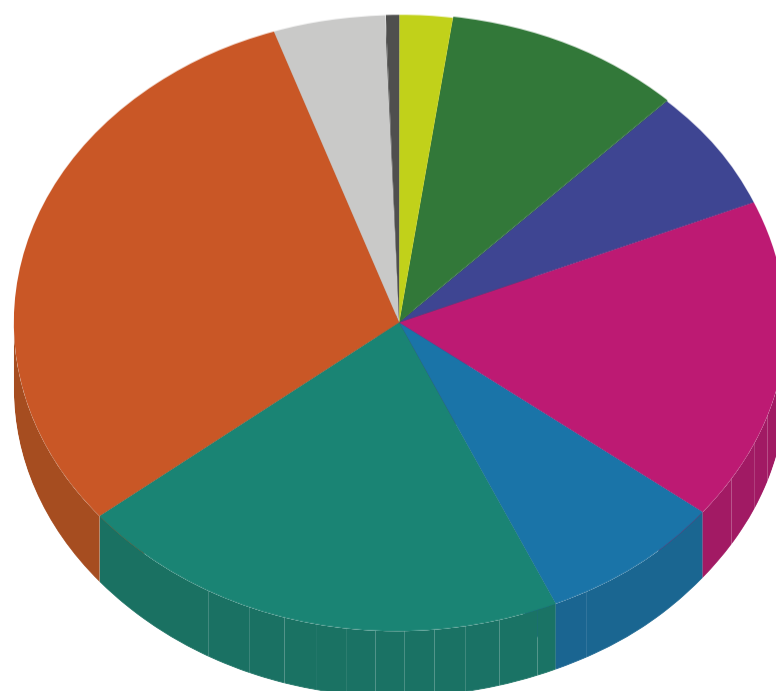
Apprenticeship programme

For the full year 2016/17 Intermediate level apprenticeships made up the highest proportion of all starts **48.8%** (**1,270**). Following this, Advanced level apprenticeships accounted for **45.4%** (**1,180**) and higher apprenticeships accounted for **5.4%** (**140**).

Educational Attainment

NVQ LEVEL 4

In 2017, **40.8%** of people aged 16-64 were educated to NVQ Level 4 or above. This is above the national average **38.3%**

NVQ LEVEL 3

62.8% were educated to NVQ level 3 Again this is above the national average at **57.1%**

NO QUALIFICATIONS

Approximately **5,700 (3.3%)** 16-64 year olds have no qualifications. This is lower than the national average in 2017 (**7.6%**).

KEY STAGE 4

In 2017, the Attainment 8 score for pupils in South Gloucestershire was **43.7** and the national figure was **44.6** (all schools)

LEVEL 2 AND 3 QUALIFICATIONS

In 2017, **60%** of pupils achieved the expected level at the end of their primary education (key stage 2), which is slightly lower than the national figure of **61%**

NOT IN EDUCATION, EMPLOYMENT OR TRAINING (NEET)

In 2017, the proportion of 16 and 17 year olds who are known to be not in education, employment or training (NEET) was **2.0%** which is lower than the national average of **2.7%**.
