## Pupil Projections for Primary Schools in the Rural Areas of South Gloucestershire

- 1. Currently, there are c.3140 pupils on roll in primary schools in the rural areas of South Gloucestershire. This represents 14% of the total primary school population on roll in schools across South Gloucestershire.
- 2. Schools in the rural areas are an important part of the school estate in South Gloucestershire and help ensure the Council is able to provide, as far as possible, an offer of a local school place to children living in villages and hamlets.
- 3. It is estimated that while the number on roll for all schools across the area is set to increase year on year for the next 5 years by an average of 3% (600 children) with an overall increase by 2017 of c. 2300 children. The number on roll in schools in the rural areas is set to remain the same year on year with no overall increase.
- 4. Falling pupil numbers on roll presents a challenge for all schools, but poses an even greater challenge for schools in the rural areas which tend to be relatively small and have significantly fewer children on roll compared with schools located in more urban areas.
- 5. The table on page 3 sets out the pupil projections for 22 schools in rural locations across South Gloucestershire and shows the number of surplus places available in each school. The number of surplus places in a school is indicated by comparing the capacity of the school with the number of pupils on roll. The table shows that 15% of places are surplus across the schools in rural locations compared with 8% in all South Gloucestershire schools. In 2017, the number of surplus places across schools in rural locations is projected to remain at 14% compared with a projected deficit of places across all South Gloucestershire schools of -2%.



6. South Gloucestershire is currently experiencing an increased demand for primary school places in Filton, Bradley Stoke, Stoke Gifford, Frenchay, Emersons Green, Mangotsfield, Kingswood and Hanham. Demand is attributed to high birth rates and significant new house building and the Council works with developers to help secure additional educational provision to meet demand. In order to assess the impact on local schools, the Council applies a calculation.

## Impact of New House building

7. In assessing the impact of new house building on the demand for primary school places and where the mix of the development is known, the Department for Children, Adults & Health multiplies the total number of dwellings planned by the number of primary school age children set out in the table below for each dwelling type.

8. In the absence of details of the exact mix of a development the Council applies a general calculation of 36 primary school age children per 100 dwellings.
