

6 Month Review 18 March 2013

Wild4life Project

Wild4life is a four year project providing opportunities for local people to get out and about and involved in their local green spaces in South Gloucestershire. The Wild4life project launched in autumn 2012 and will run until September 2016, primarily working with children, young people and families in Filton, Patchway, West Yate, Cadbury Heath, Staple Hill and Kingswood. www.southglos.gov.uk/wild4life

Wild4Life is being managed by the South Gloucestershire Council's Community Spaces team and has been funded by a grant from the Reaching Communities Fund of the Big Lottery Fund in addition to funding from South Gloucestershire Council and NHS South Gloucestershire.

During the first 6 months of the project, 16 events have been held involving 1016 people including holiday wild play workshops, wild encounter walks, Nature Play sessions, geocaching for referred families and work with special schools. Feedback has been excellent with 100% of those engaged in targeted work reporting that involvement in the project has improved their feeling of emotional well being, levels of physical activity and confidence to access local open spaces.

With the summer months to come, the next 6 months of the project will be packed with an abundance of opportunities for priority neighbourhood residents and referred groups to get outdoors and enjoy local green spaces for health and well being.

Targeted project work

Cadbury Heath Nature Play Project - Progress Summary

A programme of 10 Nature Play sessions for families attending Cadbury Heath Surestart children's centre is currently being delivered through a partnership between the Wild4life Project and the children's centre. The project aims to support families living within the priority neighbourhood and children's centre staff and volunteers to use local open spaces for outdoor play, learning and recreation to improve health and well being.

As of the date of this report (18 March 2013) 6 sessions have been delivered involving 18 children and 14 adults (including 3 fathers) between February – March 2013 and a further 4 sessions will run in April 2013. Following excellent feedback and a request from families to sustain the work into the future, parents, volunteers and other stakeholders are currently working together to explore how this work can best be carried forward into the future.
