

Key Findings:

- 1, 532 residents are claiming Jobseeker’s Allowance (0.9% of the working age population). This is a 5.3% decrease on last month’s figure and a 31.2% decrease on the number recorded at the same time last year
- The overall JSA rate for South Gloucestershire remains considerably lower than the national and sub-regional rates
- Only two wards – Kings Chase and Staple Hill have a claimant rate above the national average

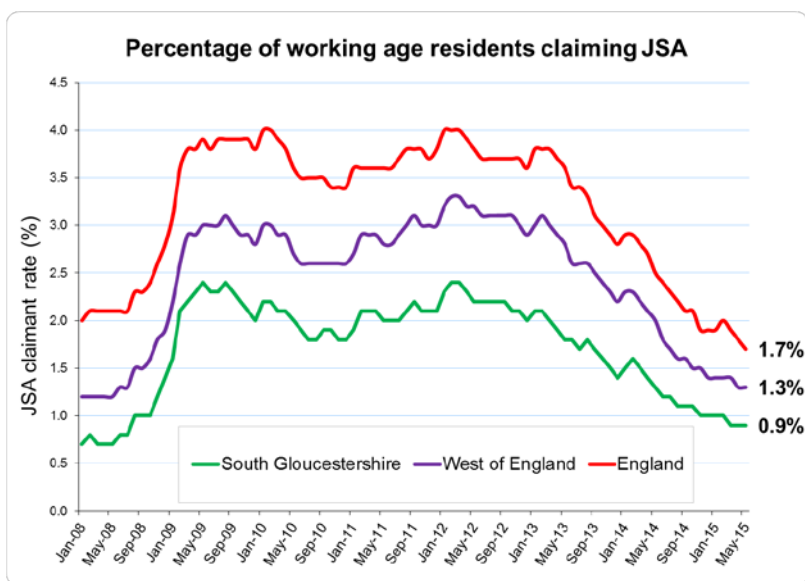
Jobseeker’s Allowance (JSA) Claimant Count Data

The monthly claimant count is not the official unemployment rate, but it provides the most detailed and regularly updated source of unemployment data at local level. Claimant count figures do not yet include claimants of Universal Credit.

In May 2015, 1,532 (0.9%) of the resident working age population in South Gloucestershire were claiming JSA. This is a 5.3% decrease on the April figure (1,617) and a 31.2% decrease on the number recorded the same time last year (2,226 / 1.3% of the working age population).

The graph shows the local JSA rate remains considerably lower than the national and sub-regional averages. It also shows there has been a steady decline across all the areas since February 2014.

It should be noted that the claimant rate fluctuates on a monthly basis, so comparing one month with another sometimes results in considerable differences.



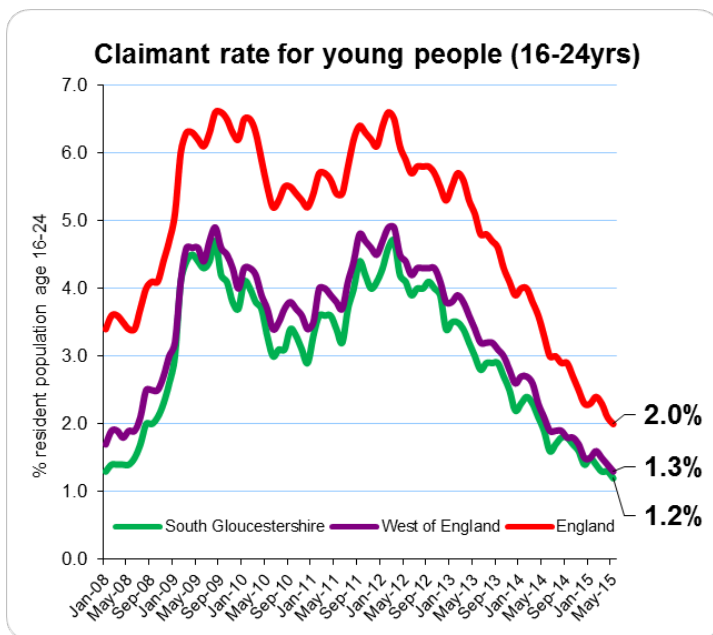

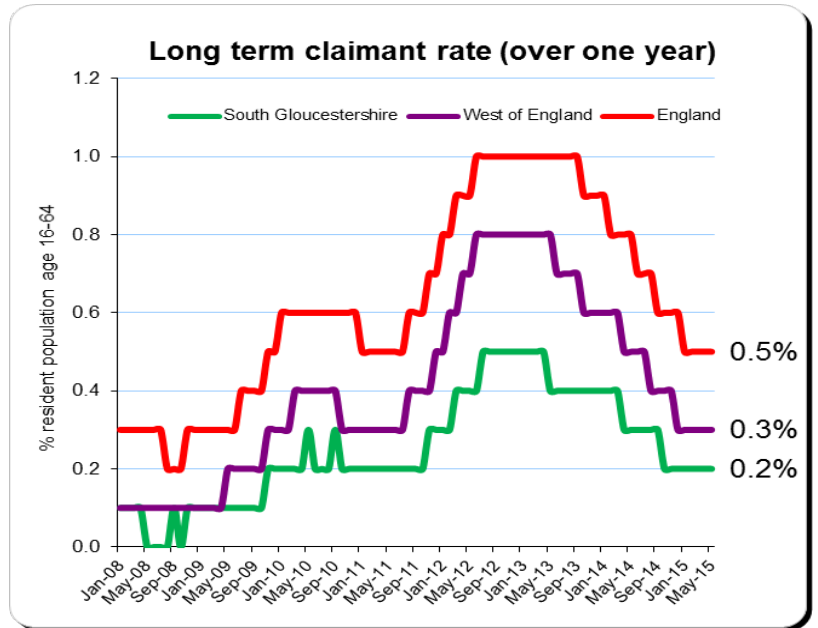
Young claimants:

In May 2015, there were 380 JSA claimants aged 16-24 in South Gloucestershire (1.2% of the resident population in that age group). This is a slight decrease on the number recorded in April (405 / 1.3%) and a considerable decrease (-35.6%) on the number recorded at the same time last year (590 / 1.9%). The young persons’ claimant rate in South Gloucestershire is below both the national and sub-regional averages.



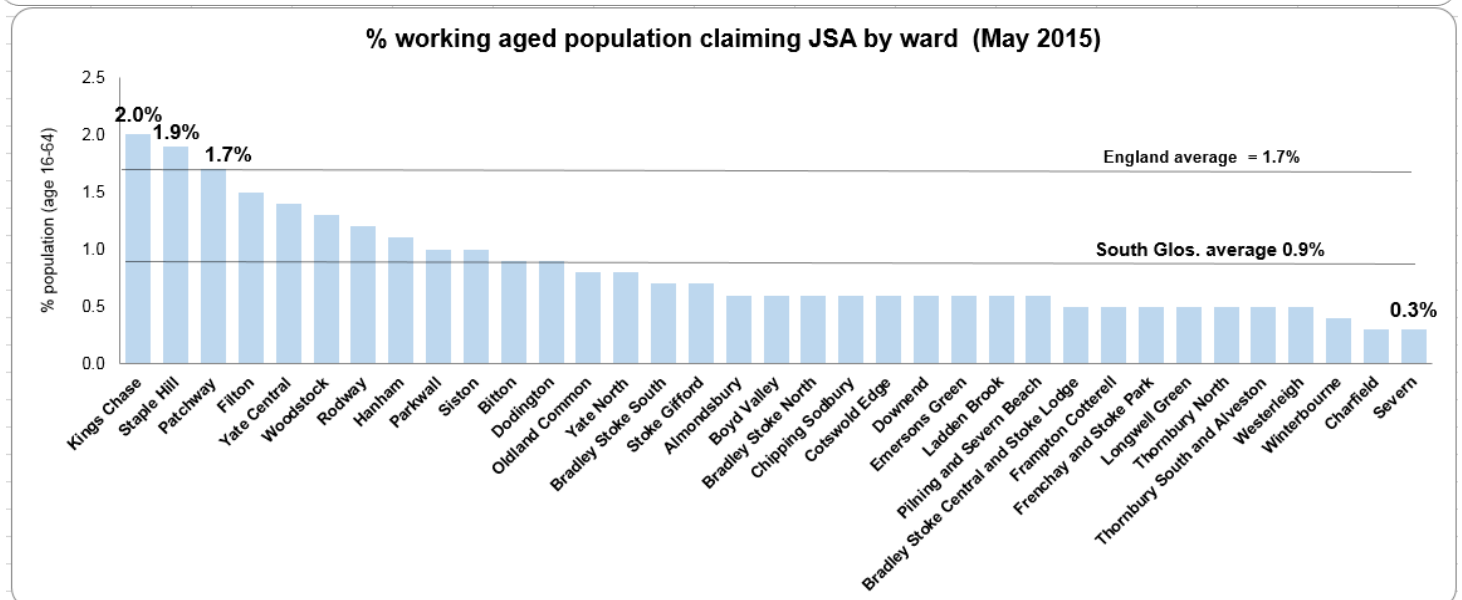
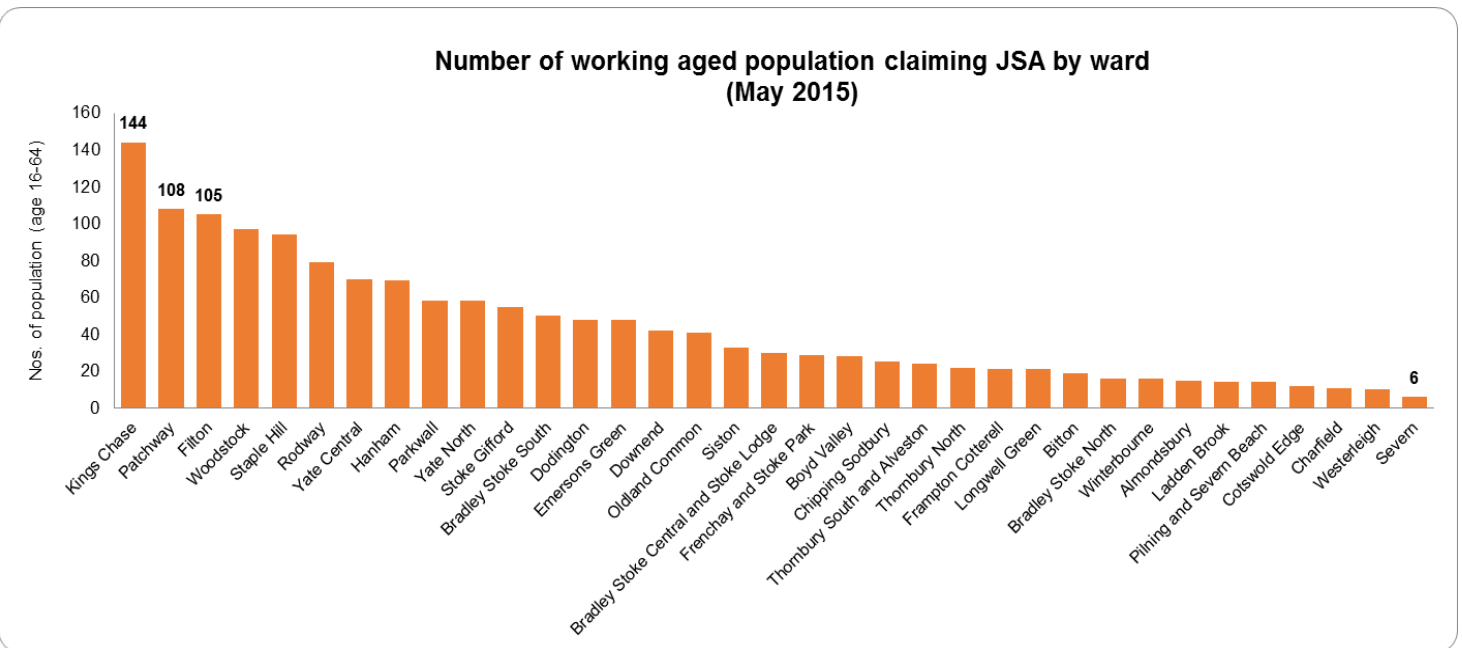
Long Term claimants:

In May 2015, 315 residents (0.2%) of the working age population had been claiming JSA benefits for over one year. This is 3.1% lower than the number recorded last month (325) and 44.7% lower than the figure recorded the same time last year (570). The long term claimant rate in South Gloucestershire remains lower than both the national and sub-regional averages.



Sub-district analysis (total JSA count and rate by ward)

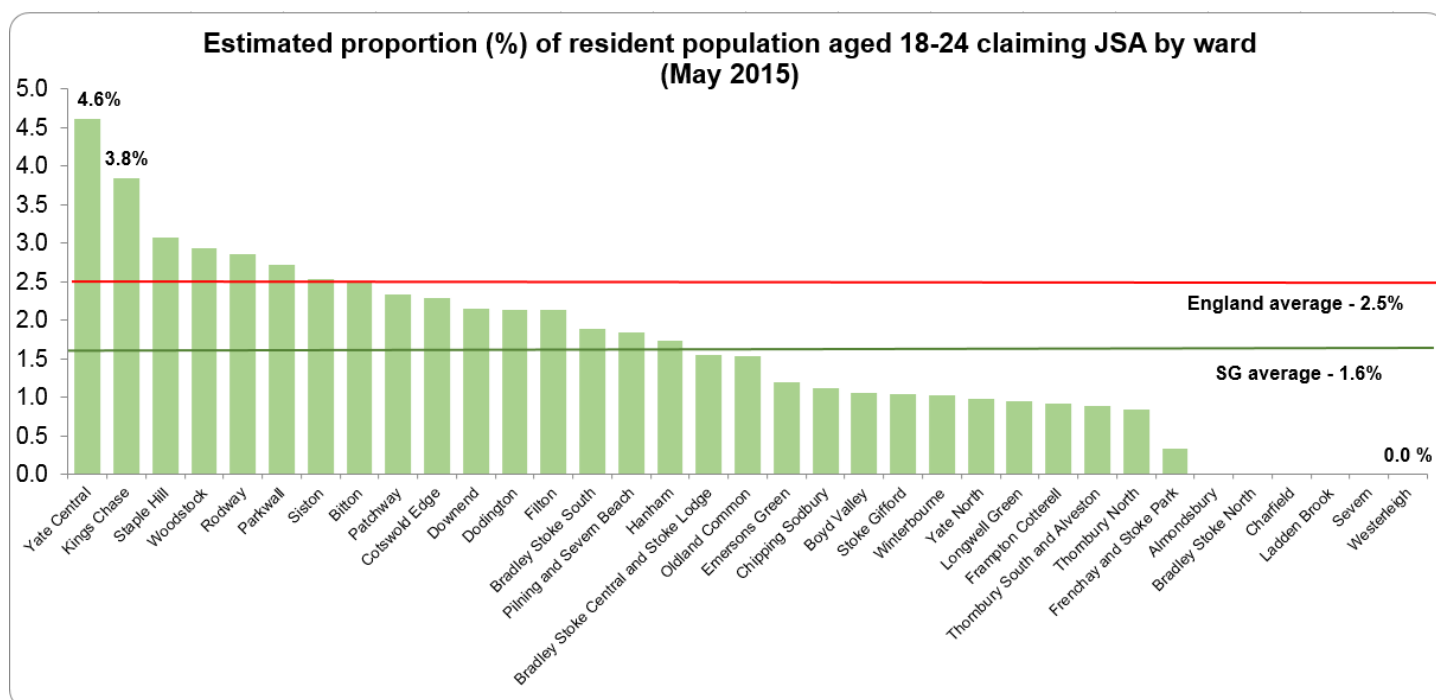
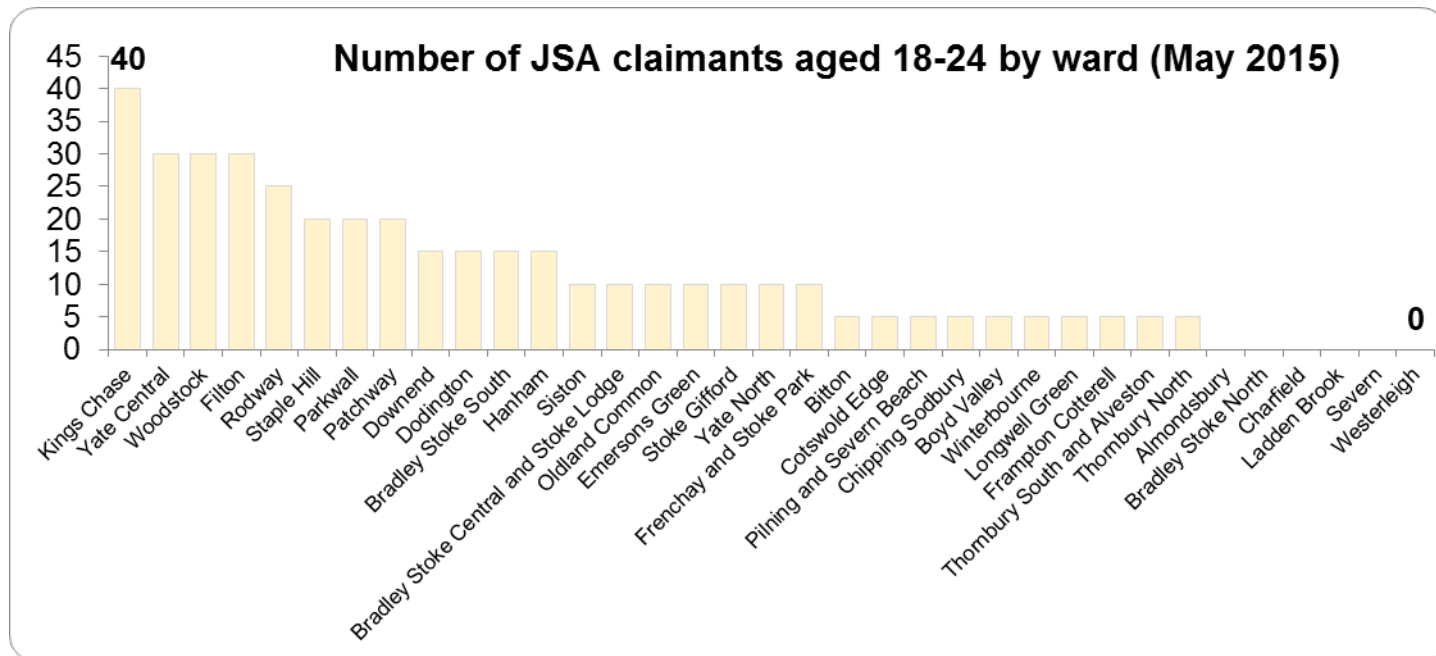
In May, Kings Chase (144), Patchway (108), and Filton (105) were the wards with the highest number of JSA claimants. Two wards - Kings Chase (2.0%) and Staple Hill (1.9%) had claimant rates above the national average and Patchway was equal to the national rate (1.7%).



Sub-district analysis (Estimates of the young persons JSA count and rate by ward)

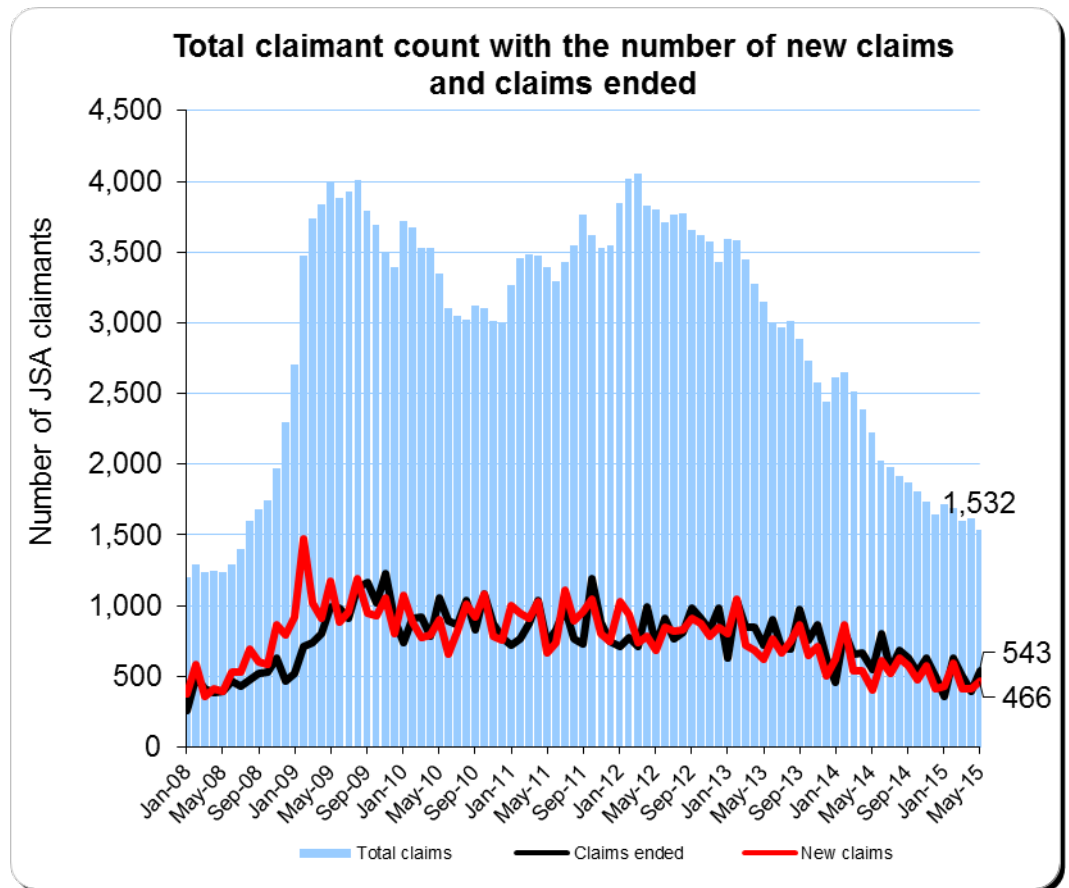
Data relating to the rate of 'young claimants' are not published at ward level therefore the figures are estimates (calculated in house) and not official statistics*.

There were approximately 380 claimants age 18 to 24 in May 2015. Kings Chase (with 40) was the ward with the highest number of JSA claimants aged 18-24. The wards with the highest proportion of their resident population aged 18-24 years claiming JSA were Yate Central (4.6%), Kings Chase (3.8%), Staple Hill (3.1%), Woodstock (2.9%), Rodway (2.9%) and Parkwall (2.7%), all of which had rates above the England average (2.5%).



* Sub-district JSA data is only available for the 18-24 age group (not the 16-24 age group). Rates are calculated using the count data for ward level analysis available via nomis and the ONS mid-year population estimates (2013) for ward level data for 18-24 year olds. Proportions for some wards may be influenced by low resident populations in the 18-24 age group and / or the effects of rounding – data is rounded to nearest 5.

In May 2015, more claims ended (543) than there were new claims made (466), resulting in an overall decrease in the total number of claimants for this period.
